**Re: S0331 -- Fair Housing Practices Act (Support)** 

Dear Chairwoman Prata and Members of the Committee.

As Executive Director of the Providence Human Relations Commission, I write to you today in full support of Senate Bill 0331.

Impaneled in 1963, the Providence Human Relations Commission works to protect and expand residents' rights to fair housing, education, employment, credit and public accommodations, free from discrimination. As it stands today, Rhode Island's Fair Housing Practices Act does not protect residents from source of income discrimination, allowing landlords to reject prospective tenants even when they can afford posted rent. This is of particular issue to the Providence Human Relations Commission, as the majority of Rhode Island's 9,300 voucher-holding families live in the capital city, and, tenants who rely on lawful non-employment income in Providence are disproportionately disabled, elderly, families with children, and of color.

I'd like to take a moment to highlight this last point. Our history is one where federally-endorsed redlining and racial steering practices have decimated communities of color, and especially denied Black families the opportunity to build generational wealth. Source of income discrimination penalizes households still reeling from the effects of these policies, reinforcing racialized patterns of homelessness, poverty and housing segregation. It further penalizes low-income households solely for being low-income, and disproportionately affects already marginalized communities.

Senate Bill 0331 stands to change these circumstances, codifying protections for households paying all or part of their rental expenses with income derived from child support, alimony, social security, supplemental security income, medical or veteran assistance benefits, and subsidy programs such as Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers. The Providence Human Relations Commission is proud to be working with Mayor Elorza to back protections against source of income discrimination at the municipal level, and urges members of the Committee to do the same, State-wide, by passing S0331. Thank you for your consideration.
