What We've Heard

Parks & Open Space

- Create trail connections between several neighborhood landmarks (Davis Park, Twitchell Park, LaSalle Academy, and Mt. Pleasant High School)
- Upgrade fields at Mt. Pleasant High School and address flooding concern
- Desire to use the sports facilities during the summer when school is not in session.
- Upgrade the clubhouse at Triggs Golf Course and open it for use by community organizations and have the senior discount for golfing reinstated
- Parks are in need of maintenance, safer environments and, in some cases, additional programming
- More patrols of Davis Park in the evenings

What We've Heard

Commercial / Economic Development

- Encourage coordinated efforts to improve facades, lighting, signage and streetscapes in the commercial areas
- Need for commercial district identities
- Castle Theater is a prominent neighborhood landmark that needs to be restored and reused

Housing

- Some homes have been neglected and are affecting the neighborhoods through declining property values and blight
- Better enforcement of building codes violations
- Want existing community development corporations to work in the neighborhoods and improve substandard housing.
- Implement home improvement programs and target these programs to certain parts of the neighborhoods

What We've Heard


Healthy Neighborhoods

- Want to maintain and grow the tree canopy in their neighborhood by adding street trees and protecting significant trees in the neighborhoods
- Need better crosswalks at numerous locations throughout neighborhood to be more pedestrian-friendly
- Litter is a key concern of most neighborhood residents and could be addressed with neighborhood cleanup days


Accessibility, Mobility, and Infrastructure

- Need more frequent transit service to Downtown and along the Chalkstone Avenue line
- Need to upgrade and repair sidewalks and road maintenance such as paving and pothole repair throughout the neighborhoods
- Bridges over the creek in Pleasant Valley Parkway need to be replaced, as they are in poor condition



CAPITOL RIDGE

DISCUSSION NOTES

- Youth sports and job development programs are needed, such as city-run sports leagues, to keep children busy
- Residents are in support of the Mayor's vision to create more afterschool programs, such as the chess club, and would encourage development of reading clubs and other activities for youth who are not inclined to participate in sports
- Residents would like to see Fargnoli Park looking beautiful again
- Organizations such as the Girl Scouts, have had difficulty offering youth programs in the public schools because they have had to fund school staff to keep buildings open and clean
- Youth organizations would likely be more willing to integrate their programs into afterschool programs if their efforts were better coordinated with existing programming and facility availability
- Residents would like to see more emphasis placed on enhancing streetscapes, beyond simply planting street trees, such as creating bio-swales to improve stormwater filtration
- Commercial districts in the neighborhood are in need of street lighting, storefront renovation, additional parking areas




