 Job Training, Economic Development, Community Centers,
 Food Banks, Senior Services, Tree Planting, Health Centers,
 Technical Assistance to New and Existing Businesses,
 Energy Efficiency and Weatherization Programs, Lead Abatement,
 Historic Preservation, Crime Prevention, Neighborhood Cleanups, etc.

# **Community Assets**



#### Accessibility & Mobility

- Need to improve connections from Elmwood and Lower South Providence into Roger Williams Park, and from Upper South Providence to Collier Park
- Traffic congestion along Elmwood Avenue, Broad Street, Eddy Street, and Public Street
- Desire for access to the waterfront and local attractions and events to draw people to the water

#### Public Services

- Want more recreation spaces and more community services geared towards children and the elderly in the neighborhood
- Residents feel that the area is underserved with respect to library facilities and schools
- Many residents expressed a need for improvement in the existing schools

#### Housing

- Would like greater access to safe and affordable housing, to improve and maintain the character of the neighborhoods
- Poor property maintenance from absentee landlords and owners
- Increasing number of vacant and foreclosed homes in the neighborhoods. Many streets have vacant, vandalized and boarded houses
- Lack of information regarding historic district guidelines for new homeowners

#### Economic Development

- Interest in retaining local businesses and finding opportunities to help them grow
- Need for jobs in the neighborhoods and for neighborhood residents

#### Healthy Neighborhoods

- Recommend that school facilities be open to the public after school hours to fully utilize resources and to allow more activities for neighborhood residents
- Would like to see public performances and displays by local artists
- Prevalence of parking on lawns, sidewalks, or double-parking, primarily on Broad Street
- Prevalence of trash and litter, need public trash cans
- Too much "street spam" of flyers and posters on the street
- Need to reuse empty and vacant lots
- Removal of unpleasant features, such as chain-link fences
- Want to preserve and utilize the abandoned synagogue on Broad Street

#### Parks & Open Space

- Additional gathering places are needed to accommodate community programs and activities, including functional open spaces with gardens and amenities, such as chess tables
- Want more green space and recreation opportunities for neighborhood youth and families
- Want to preserve opportunities for community gardening and create auxiliary programs such as a community composting program
- Fix the fountains in the Roger Williams Park so that they are functioning, expand the athletic fields and courts, ban ATVs in the park, and give more authority to park police
- Need to address graffiti and trash in the parks


#### Public Safety

- Need better communication and an improved relationship with the police
- Broken streetlights need to be fixed
- Need to embrace Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design techniques
- Prostitution, loitering and littering are serious nuisance issues for residents and businesses
- More effort should be given to promoting pedestrian safety by installing traffic signs and crossing lights
- Too much illegal on-street parking need to install proper signage, institute permit parking, and increasing enforcement
- Issues with public drinking in front of liquor stores


#### Infrastructure

- Roads, sidewalks, and streetlights need to be repaired throughout neighborhood
- Enhance streetscapes with additional trees and street furniture and bike lanes

#### **DISCUSSION NOTES**

- Many residents expressed concern over the lack of mixed-use affordable housing for seniors
- Residents believe that encouraging youth participation in community events/meetings should be a City priority
- Many residents feel that there needs to be more communication between the City and the community regarding current and future investments
- Residents feel strongly that funds should support drug prevention and re-entry programs for ex-offenders
- Residents suggested creating a community board for local events and bringing back the City's quarterly calendar of activities
- Many residents believe that there should be more dialogue between the City and local CDCs regarding CDBG funding changes
- Many residents expressed concern over the fact that the statewide transit planning effort is not including the West End neighborhood. Residents suggested that the City voice this concern.
- Residents suggested holding a series of community meetings to address public realm enhancements and better policing on Broad St between Trinity Square and Crossroads
- Residents expressed concern over the toleration of public intoxication along Broad St and requested that the licensing board adjust the operating hours of liquor stores
- Many residents feel that there needs to be a stronger partnership between the community organizations
  offering social services in the area
- Residents feel strongly that the area along Broad St between Trinity Square and Crossroads deserves additional funding given the influx of people from outside of the city that come to the area for services
- Many residents feel that impact assessments of previous funding commitments are needed
- Residents feels that the holistic approach from the 2009 neighborhood plans is not visible in the work of other city departments
- Many residents believe that the city should prioritize investing in youth in order to address the cycle of drug/alcohol addiction
- Residents expressed interest in developing a community-driven plan to be incorporated in the City's Consolidated Plan
- Many residents feel that public safety is a primary concern for the neighborhood


