### MAYOR ELORZA'S AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT ORDINANCE

#### **SUMMARY**

Mayor Jorge O. Elorza's proposed \$123,769,438 American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) budget ordinance builds an equitable, resilient recovery for Providence that aligns with the City's COVID-19 Recovery and Resiliency Task Force Recommendations for Use of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds Report.

The recommendations and proposal follow a robust 90-day community engagement process led by the City and Task Force that directly engaged over 1,500 Providence residents, business owners and community members on how to invest funds through <u>surveys</u>, community meetings and direct door-knocking in hard-hit ZIP codes.




**REVENUE RECOVERY: \$27,999,438**




