- Vendors must submit 2 copies of their response in sealed envelopes or packages labeled with the captioned Item Description and the City Department to which the solicitation is related and must include the company name and address on the envelope as well. (On page 1).
- Communications to the Board of Contract and Supply that are not competitive sealed bids (i.e. product information/samples) should have "**NOT A BID**" written on the envelope or wrapper.
- Only use form versions and templates included in this solicitation. If you have an old version of a form do not recycle it for use in this request.

BID PACKAGE SPECIFICATIONS

The City of Providence Healthy Communities Office (HCO) seeks information from service providers, community-based organizations, and/or key stakeholders on how the City of Providence can expand recovery programming, including but not limited to programs, services, events, and initiatives, to improve outcomes for residents entering and maintaining their recovery. This request is part of the City of Providence's Overdose Prevention Strategy led by the HCO.

The HCO seeks responses to the questions in the "Responses" section of this Request for Information (RFI). The HCO may use the information collected through this RFI to plan for future programs and to draft Requests for Proposal (RFP).

Background Information

The Healthy Communities Office (HCO) leads the City of Providence's health policy and promotion efforts with a mission to ensure that Providence residents have equitable access to the resources they need to lead healthy lives (<u>www.providenceri.gov/healthy</u>).

The Opioid Overdose Epidemic continues to affect the City of Providence disproportionately. In 2022, 96 individuals lost their lives to opioid overdoses in Providence. The rate of overdose fatalities in Providence has been the second highest in the state since 2017, except for 2018, when it was the highest in Rhode Island¹. Unfortunately, each life lost is a loved one, family member, or friend and preventable death.

During that same period, 2017-2022, there were reports of over 3,000 non-fatal overdoses in the City of Providence. In 2022, 615 non-fatal overdoses occurred, accounting for 28% of statewide non-fatal overdoses;ⁱ² Providence is home to 17% of Rhode Island's total population³. Additional risks and harms are associated with substance use disorder that impacts individuals, families, and the Providence community. The City of Providence is committed to implementing a comprehensive strategy to reduce overdose deaths and substance use-related harms over the next 3-5 years.

The City of Providence Overdose Prevention Strategy aims to de-escalate substance-related harms, especially overdose, across the continuum of opioid risk using the framework below:

Guiding Principles:

- 1. Advance Health Equity
- 2. Address Social Determinants of Health
- 3. Build Community Capacity and Empowerment

- 4. Increase Coordination & Collaboration
- 5. Enhance Data-Driven Decision-Making

Strategic Priorities:

- 1. Promotion
- 2. Prevention
- 3. Rescue/Harm Reduction
- 4. Treatment
- 5. Recovery

Currently, the HCO is exploring options for recovery programming, including but not limited to programs, services, events, and initiatives within the Recovery strategic priority. The Recovery strategic priority focuses on increasing recovery programming by implementing activities across multiple pathways of recovery, prioritizing whole health and wellness, and collaborating with people with lived experience to build community and social connectedness for individuals at every stage of recovery.

HCO is requesting information on how to best support recovery programming for Providence residents. HCO wants to understand better how to improve outcomes for residents entering and maintaining recovery by:

- 1. Closing gaps in recovery programming available in Providence.
- 2. Expanding existing recovery programming in scope and scale.
- 3. Creating sustainable recovery programming and initiatives in Providence.
- 4. Minimizing barriers to accessing recovery programming.

Responses

This RFI seeks responses from service providers, community-based organizations, and/or other key stakeholders. The feedback from this RFI may be used to develop future Requests for Proposals and to implement recovery programming if it is in the best interest of the City.

Guidelines for Submission

RFI respondents should provide a general overview of gaps and barriers and the solution(s) they would provide.

RFI respondents should, at a minimum, respond to the questions below:

- 1. What is the most significant gap in recovery programming for Providence residents?
- 2. What are the factors that contribute to the described gap?
- 3. How does the described gap negatively impact Providence residents?
- 4. Who is most impacted by the described gap?
- 5. What is a proven approach to recovery programming that would fill the gap described? Please include if this is a new or existing approach that needs to be expanded.
- 6. Who is the target population of the proposed approach?



- 7. How does the proposed approach address one or more guiding principles listed in the "Background" section?
- 8. How does the proposed approach address the Recovery strategic priority focus described in the "Background" section?
- 9. What are the outcomes of the proposed approach? How would the outcomes be measured?
- 10. What support would be needed from the city upfront or on an ongoing basis to implement the proposed approach?
- 11. What is the anticipated cost of the proposed approach?
- 12. What are the barriers faced by organizations to providing recovery programming?
- 13. How can the City help to minimize or overcome the organizational barriers listed?
- 14. What are the barriers faced by individuals to accessing recovery programming?
- 15. How can the City help minimize or overcome the individual barriers listed?
