Prospective bidders are hereby notified of **ADDENDUM No. 1** for the Amphitheater Stage Improvements at Waterplace Park project. The items set forth herein, whether of omission, addition, substitution, or other change, shall be incorporated into the Contract Documents for the work.

Bidders shall acknowledge receipt of this **Addendum No. 1** on the Bid Form (page 14 of 28 of the Request for Proposals).

The deadline for bids remains unchanged. Bids are due **Monday, April 7, 2025 at 2:15 PM.**

Item No. 1: Pre-Bid Conference

A non-mandatory Pre-Bid Conference was held at the project site on Tuesday, March 25, 2025. For informational purposes, the meeting agenda and sign-in sheet are attached.

Item No. 2: Questions & Answers

The following questions were received during the Pre-Bid Conference.

Q1: Will the Contractor have access to the electrical panels in the maintenance building?

A1: Access to the maintenance building during construction will be provided by the Parks Department.

Q2: Are the stair railings at each side of the stage included?

A2: Repairs to the existing handrail systems located along Stair B-1 and Stair B-2 are not included in the scope of work.

Q3: The granite blocks near the back corners of the stage are scheduled to be removed and salvaged. Where will these blocks need to be moved? Can these blocks remain in place?

A3: Removing and salvaging the existing granite blocks adjacent to the back corners of the stage has been eliminated from the scope of work. Sheet D-1 of the Drawings has been revised.

Q4: Do the granite pavers extend under the stage?

A4: Most of the ground surface within the footprint of the existing stage consists of granite pavers. Refer to Appendix C of the Technical Specifications for the available existing plans. The intent of the proposed removal and resetting of the existing granite pavers adjacent to the back of the existing stage is to restore the original grading of the paver surface between the stage and the back of the existing concrete river wall within the limits shown on Sheet S-1 of the Drawings.

Q5: Is erosion control required?

A5: Erosion, runoff, and sediment control measures are required for land disturbing activities associated with the project. Refer to the Erosion & Sediment Control Notes on the Cover Sheet of the Drawings and Appendix A of the Technical Specifications for specific requirements stipulated by the RI Coastal Resources Management Council (CRMC) Maintenance Certification for the proposed work.

Item No. 3: Revisions to the Drawings**1. D-1 DEMOLITION PLAN**

DELETE	Sheet D-1 in its entirety.
INSERT	Sheet D-1 (REV. 1). A note has been added regarding removal and disposal of debris from the existing stage framing to remain and from the existing granite paver surface. Removal and salvaging of the existing granite blocks adjacent to the back corners of the stage has been eliminated from the scope of work.

2. E-3 ELECTRICAL SITE PLAN

DELETE Sheet E-3 in its entirety.

INSERT Sheet E-3 (REV. 1). General Sheet Note No. 2 and Key Note No. 9 have been revised. Additionally, the dimming driver for the proposed surface mount step light ("0-10V" in the Luminaire Schedule) has been stricken.

7. Retainage

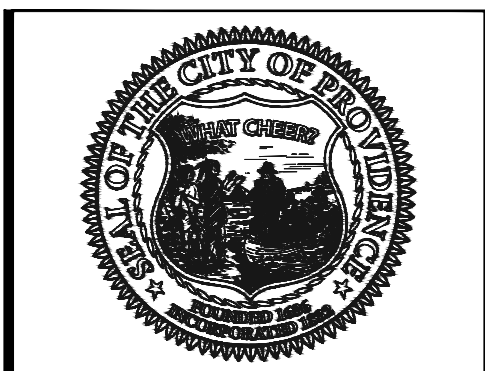

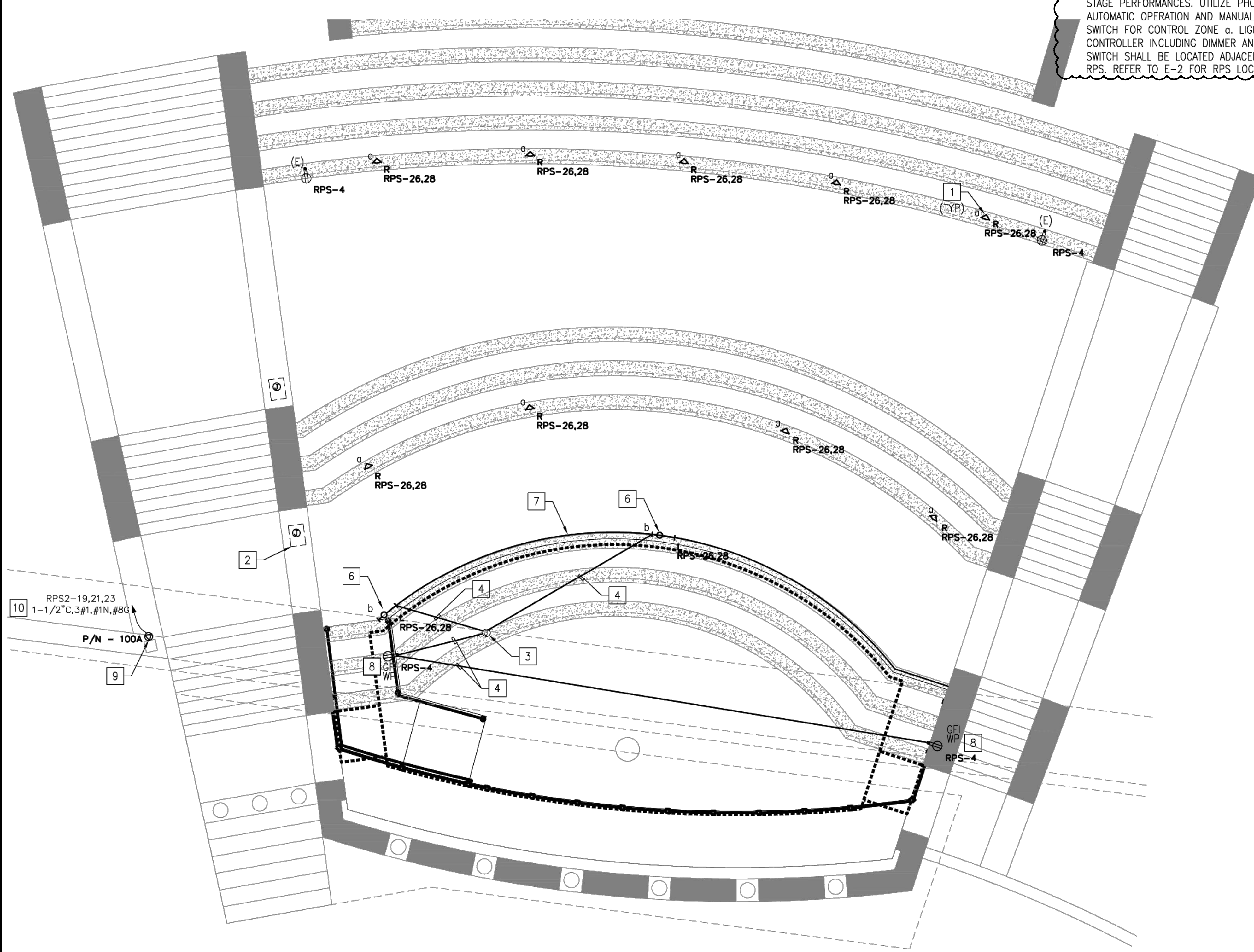

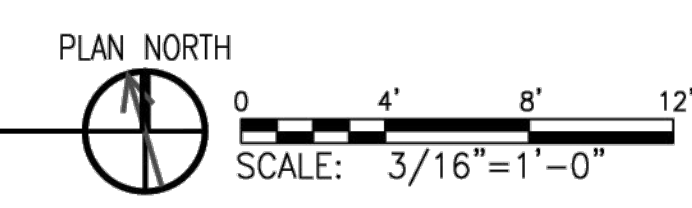

A. Paid Holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day, plus Presidents' Day, Columbus Day, Veteran's Day & V-J Day, providing the employee has worked at least one day in the calendar week in which the holiday falls.

B. Employee who has been on the payroll for 1 year or more but less than 5 years and has worked 150 Days during the last year of employment shall receive 1 week's paid vacation; 5 to 10 years - 2 weeks' paid vacation; 10 or more years - 3 week's paid vacation.

C. Employees on the seniority list shall be paid a one hundred dollar (\$100.00) bonus for every four hundred (400) hours worked, up to a maximum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00)

All drivers working on a defined hazard material job site shall be paid a premium of \$2.00 per hour over applicable rate.

TRUCK DRIVER CLASSIFICATIONS

GROUP 1: Pick-up trucks, station wagons, & panel trucks

GROUP 2: Two-axle on low beds

GROUP 3: Two-axle dump truck

GROUP 4: Three-axle dump truck

GROUP 5: Four- and five-axle equipment

GROUP 6: Low-bed or boom trailer.

GROUP 7: Trailers when used on a double hook up (pulling 2 trailers)

GROUP 8: Special earth-moving equipment, under 35 tons

GROUP 9: Special earth-moving equipment, 35 tons or over

GROUP 10: Tractor trailer

WELDERS - Receive rate prescribed for craft performing operation to which welding is incidental.

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Note: Executive Order (EO) 13706, Establishing Paid Sick Leave for Federal Contractors applies to all contracts subject to the Davis-Bacon Act for which the contract is awarded (and any solicitation was issued) on or after January 1, 2017. If this contract is covered by the EO, the contractor must provide employees with 1 hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours they work, up to 56 hours of paid sick leave each year. Employees must be permitted to use paid sick leave for their own illness, injury or other health-related needs, including preventive care; to assist a family member (or person who is like family to the employee) who is ill, injured, or has other health-related needs, including preventive care; or for reasons resulting from, or to assist a family member (or person who is like family to the employee) who is a victim of, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking. Additional information on contractor requirements and worker protections under the EO is available at <https://www.dol.gov/agencies/whd/government-contracts>.

Unlisted classifications needed for work not included within the scope of the classifications listed may be added after award only as provided in the labor standards contract clauses (29CFR 5.5 (a) (1) (iii)).

The body of each wage determination lists the classifications and wage rates that have been found to be prevailing for the type(s) of construction and geographic area covered by the wage

determination. The classifications are listed in alphabetical order under rate identifiers indicating whether the particular rate is a union rate (current union negotiated rate), a survey rate, a weighted union average rate, a state adopted rate, or a supplemental classification rate.

Union Rate Identifiers

A four-letter identifier beginning with characters other than ""SU"", ""UAVG"", ?SA?, or ?SC? denotes that a union rate was prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2024. PLUM is an identifier of the union whose collectively bargained rate prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. The date, 07/01/2024 in the example, is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all changes over time that are reported to WHD in the rates in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing the classification.

Union Average Rate Identifiers

The UAVG identifier indicates that no single rate prevailed for those classifications, but that 100% of the data reported for the classifications reflected union rates. EXAMPLE: UAVG-OH-0010 01/01/2024. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the State of Ohio. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. The date, 01/01/2024 in the example, indicates the date the wage determination was updated to reflect the most current union average rate.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January, to reflect a weighted average of the current rates in the collective bargaining agreements on which the rate is based.

Survey Rate Identifiers

The ""SU"" identifier indicates that either a single non-union rate prevailed (as defined in 29 CFR 1.2) for this classification in the survey or that the rate was derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As a weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SUFL2022-007 6/27/2024. SU indicates the rate is a single non-union prevailing rate or a weighted average of survey data for that classification. FL indicates the State of Florida. 2022 is the year of the survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. The date, 6/27/2024 in the example, indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

?SU? wage rates typically remain in effect until a new survey is conducted. However, the Wage and Hour Division (WHD) has the discretion to update such rates under 29 CFR 1.6(c)(1).

State Adopted Rate Identifiers

The "SA" identifier indicates that the classifications and prevailing wage rates set by a state (or local) government were adopted under 29 C.F.R 1.3(g)-(h). Example: SAME2023-007 01/03/2024. SA reflects that the rates are state adopted. ME refers to the State of Maine. 2023 is the year during which the state completed the survey on which the listed classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. The date, 01/03/2024 in the example, reflects the date on which the classifications and rates under the "SA" identifier took effect under state law in the state from which the rates were adopted.

WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- a) a survey underlying a wage determination
- b) an existing published wage determination
- c) an initial WHD letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- d) an initial conformance (additional classification and rate) determination

2) If an initial decision has been issued, then any interested party (those affected by the action) that disagrees with the decision can request review and reconsideration from the Wage and Hour Administrator (See 29 CFR Part 1.8 and 29 CFR Part 7). The request should be accompanied by a full statement of the interested party's position and any information (wage payment

data, project description, area practice material, etc.) that the requestor considers relevant to the issue.
